Nursing Education Programs Executive Summary

The California Community Colleges serve more than 2.4 million students each year and is the largest system of higher education in the nation. The state's 112 community colleges are charged with providing workforce training, basic skills education, and preparing students to transfer to four-year universities.

Seventy-six California community colleges operate registered nursing programs, enrolling a statewide total of 12,297 full-time-equivalent students (FTES)¹.

Enrollments have increased by about 27 percent since 2006-07 academic year due to the development of new programs, expansion of enrollment capacity through partnerships with the healthcare industry, and federal and state funded programs and grants.

Colleges with nursing programs receive funding through general apportionment/FTES. This report presents information on categorical funding awarded through an application process to the community colleges for nursing programs in fiscal year 2011-12.

This report also includes a summary on Nursing Program Support provided in the Budget Act of 2011 to expand community college nursing enrollments and to improve student retention (required by Provision (23) of Item 6870-101-0001 of the Budget Act of 2011).

Reporting Requirements

Education Code Section 78261, subdivision (g) requires: “As a condition of receiving grant funds pursuant to paragraph (2) of subdivision (d), each recipient district shall report to the Chancellor’s Office the following data for the academic year on or before a date determined by the Chancellor’s Office:

- (1) The number of students enrolled in the nursing program.
- (2) The number of students taking diagnostic assessments.
- (3) The number of students failing to meet proficiency levels as determined by diagnostic assessment tools.
- (4) The number of students failing to meet proficiency levels that undertake pre-entry preparation classes.
- (5) The number of students who successfully complete pre-entry preparation coursework.
- (6) The average number of months between initial diagnostic assessment, demonstration of readiness, and enrollment in the nursing program for students failing to meet proficiency standards on the initial diagnostic assessment.
- (7) The average number of months between diagnostic assessment and program enrollment for students meeting proficiency standards on the initial diagnostic assessment.
- (8) The number of students who completed the associate degree nursing program and the number of students who pass the National Council Licensure Examination.

In subdivision (h) of Education Code Section 78261, the reporting requirements continue:

- (1) Data reported to the Chancellor’s Office under this article shall be disaggregated by age, gender, ethnicity, and language spoken at home.
- (2) The Chancellor’s Office shall compile and provide this information to the Legislature and the governor by March 1 of each year.”

Data Required by SB 1309, Statutes of 2006

SB 1309 (Stats. 2006, Chap. 837) requires the Chancellor's Office to collect and report data from colleges receiving grants on the results of assessment testing for students as a condition of enrollment. Colleges were required to provide remediation to those students who did not achieve a statewide passing score.

The Chancellor's Office works with assessment vendors and colleges to collect the data required in Education Code Section 78261, subdivision (g). The vendors provided information on exam results, gender, ethnicity, and age for students. The colleges then provided information on remediation and enrollment.

In addition, this data reflects students who received assessment testing between January 2011 and June 2012.

In response to subsection (g)(8), Table 6 lists the colleges, the number of students from the colleges that took the licensure exam, and the pass rate from 2007-08 through 2011-12.

Overview of Funding

Nursing

The overview of funding is detailed on tables beginning on page 7. A list of the colleges that received funding for the 2011-12 fiscal year, the amount received, and the number of full-time equivalent students served in academic years 2006-07 through 2011-12 is provided on Table 1. In 2011-12, the Budget Act provided approximately \$13.4 million in Proposition 98 funds to be allocated as follows: \$8.5 million to further expand community college nursing slots, and \$4.9 million to provide diagnostic and support services to reduce student attrition. (These funds are described further in Table 2).

Federal Workforce Investment Act (WIA) funds were drastically reduced by approximately 73 percent (from \$3 million to \$800,000) provided for the Governor's Nurse Education Initiative (NEI). The impact of this sudden reduction of funds resulted in students receiving notification that the classes would be discontinued, halfway through their programs. This reduction also impacted many students who were returning veterans. Fortunately, the Chancellor's Office was able to identify additional funds to continue supporting the program and courses through June 30, 2012 with Proposition 98 funds. The Chancellor's Office accomplished this by redirecting \$1,296,481 from State Proposition 98 funds to support the colleges who did not receive money from WIA (see Table 1).

In the months following, the Chancellor's Office received a subgrant from EDD WIA 15 percent funding of \$800,000 for the NEI Phase II project with term date from July 1, 2011 to March 31, 2014. These were partial funds from previous fiscal year's WIA dollars. Our office allocated \$190,000 each to four colleges (American River, Butte, Mt. San Jacinto and College of the Sequoias) to assist lowering nursing attrition rates, increase nursing faculty, expand public/private partnerships to develop additional nursing education capabilities and expand nursing slots by 165 nursing students, giving preference to eligible veterans.

Table 3 lists the colleges receiving these funds, funds awarded and the number of additional nursing slots created. The remaining \$40,000 goes to administration for a total of \$800,000.

Key Findings

The Budget Act of 2011 directed the Chancellor's Office to report on the award of nursing grants funded by the \$13.4 million provided. These funds were awarded to colleges that participated in an application process in the spring of 2010 for a two-year cycle of enrollment expansion which began in the fall of 2010 and ended in June 2012. Below is summary information that addresses the specific areas (numbered) required by the Budget Act of 2011.

1. Amount of Funding Received

Funds were awarded based on an application process conducted in the spring of 2010 for projects to be funded during FY 2010-11 and FY 2011-12. The Chancellor's Office awarded funds to all colleges that applied, but not all colleges received the funding they requested. The following is a description of the grants that were awarded.

Enrollment Growth for Nursing: Sixty-two colleges received grants to expand enrollments by 1,371 students. Some colleges requested additional funds to expand enrollments in the second year of the two-year cycle; however, funding these requests was not possible because of the reduction in funds.

Assessment, Remediation and Retention Funds: During 2011-12, all 62 colleges that requested enrollment growth funds received funds for diagnostic and support services, pre-entry coursework, and other services to reduce attrition. Table 2 provides a list of the colleges receiving funds for this purpose and provides a list of all community college nursing programs with their respective attrition rates as reported to the Board of Registered Nursing for the 2010-11 Annual School Report. (see further discussion in number 3).

2. Number of nursing FTES grants awarded

Colleges receiving nursing grants for enrollment growth had 12,297 nursing FTES in 2011-12. As a condition of receiving grant funds, colleges maintained approximately 1,371 nursing slots (FTES) statewide this year.

3. College Attrition and Completion Rates

The Chancellor's Office used data reported by the colleges to the Board of Registered Nursing to determine the attrition rate for each college program. Data were collected on students who were scheduled, on admission, to complete the program between Aug. 1, 2010, and July 31, 2011. These students have benefitted from the specific retention activities that were funded with grant funds. The attrition data are presented in Table 4. Attrition rates were calculated by using the following data reported by the colleges:

- Total number of students scheduled, on admission, to complete the program between Aug. 1, 2010, and July 31, 2011.
- The number of students who dropped out of the program or were disqualified are subtracted from this number.
- The number of students who completed the program on time, or who are still enrolled in the program remain.

4. Equipment/Infrastructure Purchases

In FY 2011-12, colleges reported expenditures of approximately \$182,273 for capital outlay (equipment and related costs).

5. Number of New and Existing Faculty Receiving Annual Stipend Awards

Since 2006-07, the Chancellor's Office has annually conducted a competitive grant process to award the funds designated for annual nursing stipend awards. Eighteen colleges are participating in these grants. Last year, these stipends provided for:

- One new full-time faculty member.
- 56 full-time faculty members within their first five years of teaching nursing received stipend awards.
- 43 existing faculty members and three new faculty members will receive annual stipend awards for teaching evening and weekend clinical assignments.
