

ADVANCING BACCALAUREATE ATTAINMENT

The webinar focused on community college baccalaureate degree programs. Guest presenters included Dr. Constance Carroll, President and CEO of the California Community Colleges Baccalaureate <u>Association</u>, Lisa Kamibayashi of West Los Angeles College, Billie Jo Rice of Bakersfield College, and Harris Escobar and Nick Pressley, students enrolled in these two CCC BA programs.

What is the Value of Community College BA Degrees?

- Community college baccalaureate programs can address regional <u>workforce</u> needs and increase educational attainment to help California meet its 70% college attainment goal.
- The high school diploma is no longer the entry requirement for most jobs, and a bachelor's degree offers economic <u>benefits</u> to students.
- While there are other ways to increase baccalaureate attainment, community college programs can serve students whose needs are not met by those options.
- Community college baccalaureate programs are increasingly common, currently offered at more than 140 colleges across 25 states. California recently <u>approved</u> the degree as a permanent policy, after 15 colleges saw success in pilot programs.
- <u>Students</u> served by these programs are more likely to be from underrepresented or underserved <u>backgrounds</u>, and many say they would not otherwise have pursued a bachelor's degree so the programs can increase equity in access, especially for <u>place-bound</u> students.
- Student <u>outcomes</u> also point to increased <u>equity</u>, with most graduates finding <u>employment</u> in their field of study; students in CCC programs can generally avoid loan debt due to the lower cost of the programs.
- The programs are generally built on existing associate degree programs, making use of experienced faculty and high-quality facilities and equipment.

How are CCCs Approaching Development of BA Programs?

- West Los Angeles College's BS in <u>Dental Hygiene</u>:
 - Started in 2016, building on a long-standing AS degree that is affiliated with UCLA's School of Dentistry.
 - Has students enroll full time over 21 months, including 4 semesters, 2 winter sessions and 2 summer sessions (14 units per semester, 6 units in winter/summer).

- Accepts two cohorts per year; a fall cohort attends 8am to 5pm, Mon.- Fri., and a spring cohort has later hours with some weekends/nights.
- Offers a pathway into multiple careers in addition to clinical dental hygienist, including in education, sales, research, and public health.
- Provides the degree at considerably lower cost than similar programs at private schools, including \$8,450 for 65 units of upper division courses, \$10,000 for specialized educational materials, and some required fees.
- Saw applications increase when the BS program started (compared to AS);
 application numbers have recovered from pandemic-era declines.
- Includes a completion program for people holding AS degrees in dental hygiene.
- Bakersfield College's BS in <u>Industrial Automation</u>:
 - Relies on an advisory committee and strong relationships with industry partners to ensure the program meets local workforce needs and offers employability at a living wage for students.
 - o Includes general education courses tailored to the program's focus.
 - Offers pathways into the program via multiple certificate and degree programs at the college, through intentional alignment efforts.
 - o Enrolls a racially diverse student population and engages in outreach to increase female enrollment in the traditionally male-dominated field.
 - Has partnerships with K-12 to provide pathways through dual enrollment and is working to scale its efforts to enroll justice-involved students.
 - Provides students with internships through partnerships with local employers.
 - Has seen its graduates find immediate employment with an average starting salary of \$70,000.

What is the Student Experience in these Programs?

- Students appreciate the opportunity to complete a bachelor's degree at the same institution where they initially enrolled in college, as many are place-bound with work or family obligations that make it difficult to move to attend a university.
- Students report receiving a rigorous, quality education and finding great support from faculty, staff, and other students to achieve their educational and career goals.
- Students appreciate the lower cost of the programs, and the opportunity to pursue programs with a hands-on, career-relevant focus and good connections to employers.
