State and Federal Policy Update

This document is prepared by the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office as part of its regular monthly and bimonthly updates for the Consultation Council and the Board of Governors, respectively. The information presented herein is current as of February 28, 2025, at the time of Board items were due. STATE LEGISLATION OVERVIEW

As of this writing, the Chancellor's Office is tracking 96 Tier 1 Assembly Bills (AB) and Senate Bills (SB). These bills are most likely to have a direct impact on the California Community Colleges, students, faculty, staff, operations, programs, and services. The last day to introduce new bills was February 21, 2025.

CONGRESSIONAL UPDATE

Budget Update

The United States Senate has voted 52-48 to approve a two-part budget resolution, with a focus first on military and immigration enforcement spending, followed by a tax bill later this year. The U.S. House of Representatives, on the other hand, has voted 217-215 to approve a single legislative package approach, combining spending and tax cuts in response to President Donald Trump's call for "one big, beautiful bill." The Senate and House are now working to develop a consensus approach to budget and appropriations for FY 2025 and FY 2026. Meanwhile, the Continuing Resolution (CR) enacted in December 2024 to keep funding in place temporarily at FY 2024 levels expires on March 14, 2025. Congress may adopt another CR short-term while budget negotiations continue.

U.S. Department of Education Leadership

Linda McMahon – Secretary

Linda McMahon will serve as Secretary of Education leading the Education Department. The co-founder and former CEO of World Wrestling Entertainment has constantly been involved with the Trump administration and his presidential campaigns. During Trumps first term she was leader of the Small Business Administration. Additionally, she has co-chaired the Trump-Vance transition team and chaired the Trump-aligned American First Policy Institute think tank in their efforts against diversity, equity, and inclusion programs in education. Previously McMahon has served on the board of trustees for Sacred Heart University and on the Connecticut Board of Education for a year in 2019.

Penny Schwinn - Deputy Secretary

Dr. Penny Schwinn previously served as Commissioner of the Tennessee Department of Education starting in 2019. She began her career in education as a high school history and economics teacher in Baltimore, Maryland. Prior to her role as commissioner, she served as Chief Deputy Commissioner of Academics at the Texas Education Agency. Dr. Schwinn has also served as Assistant Secretary of Education at the Delaware Department of Education and as Assistant Superintendent of Performance Management for the Sacramento City Unified School District in California. She is also the founder and former superintendent of Capitol College Collegiate Academy. Dr. Schwinn holds a bachelor's degree from the University of California-Berkley, a Master of Arts in teaching from John Hopkins University, and a PhD in Education Policy from Claremont Graduate University.

Nicholas Kent - Under Secretary

Nicholas Kent joins the Department of Education as Under Secretary of Education after serving as Deputy Secretary of Education for the Commonwealth of Virginia under Governor Glenn Youngkin. Previously he was the Chief Policy Officer a Career Education Colleges and Universities (CECU), a higher education trade association. Before is role at CECU he was the directory of Policy, Planning, and Research at the DC office of the State

Superintendent of Education. Kent holds a Master of Arts degree in higher education administration from George Washington University.

James Bergeron - Deputy Under Secretary

James Bergeron recently served as President and Chief Executive Officer of the National Council of Higher Education Resources. In this capacity, he provided day-to-day leadership, operational management, financial health, direction, and growth to the organization and assisted members in carrying out their public service missions to increase college access and success. Previously, Bergeron worked as the Director of Education and Human Services Policy for the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Education and the Workforce where he developed and managed the committee's legislative agenda, including the reauthorization of the Higher Education Act, Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act, and Workforce Innovation Opportunity Act. Before joining the committee, Bergeron served as Legislative Director for Rep. Buck McKeon where he was responsible for developing the legislative agenda within the House Subcommittee on 21st Century Competitiveness around financial aid simplification and regulatory relief. He received a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from the University of Louisiana at Lafayette.

Leadership at the U.S. Department of Labor

Lori Chavez-DeRamer

Lori Chavez-DeRemer was previously elected to represent Oregon's 5th Congressional District in 2022, making her the first Republican woman from Oregon to serve in the U.S. House of Representatives. During her time in Congress, she advocated for the Protecting the Right to Organize Act, a bill designed to facilitate the formation of labor unions by overturning state Right to Work laws, which undermine union strength. Before her election to Congress, Chavez-DeRemer served as former mayor of Happy Valley, Oregon from 2010-2018 and on the Happy Valley city council from 2005 to 2010, where she was president beginning in 2007. She received a bachelor's degree in business administration from California State University, Fresno.

Keith Sonderling- Deputy Secretary of Labor

Keith Sonderling was previously Commissioner on the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) he previously served as the Commission's Vice Chair prior. Prior to Sonderling's confirmation to the EEOC, he served as the Acting and Deputy Administrator of the Wage and Hour Division at the U.S. Department of Labor. Before joining the Department of Labor in 2017, Sonderling practiced Labor and Employment law in Florida with. In 2012, he was appointed to serve as the Chair of the Judicial Nominating Committee for appellate courts in South Florida by then-Governor Rick Scott. Sonderling was also active in the community, serving on the Board of Directors for Morse Life Health System, the Boca Raton Chamber of Commerce, and Leadership Florida. Sonderling also serves as a Professional Lecturer in the Law at the George Washington University Law School, teaching employment discrimination.

FEDERAL LEGISLATION

American Dream and Promise Act of 2025

Congresswoman Sylvia Garcia (D-TX-29) has reintroduced the bipartisan American Dream and Promise Act of 2025, or Dream Act. The Dream Act would provide a pathway to citizenship to Dreamers, undocumented immigrants who were brought to the United States as children. It would also include recipients of Temporary Protected Status (TPS) and Deferred Enforced Departure (DED) beneficiaries. The Dream Act has over 200 House co-sponsors.

Reintroduction of the bipartisan "Jumpstarting Our Businesses by Supporting Students (JOBS) Act"

United States (U.S.) Senators Tim Kaine (D-VA), Susan Collins (R-ME), Tina Smith (D-MN), and Roger Marshall (R-KS) have introduced S. 383, the Jumpstarting Our Businesses by Supporting Students (JOBS) Act, bipartisan legislation to help more Americans get goodpaying jobs by allowing students to use federal Pell Grants to pay for shorter-term job training programs. By expanding Pell Grant eligibility, the JOBS Act is intended to help close the skills gap by allowing people to access job training they might otherwise be unable to afford but need for careers in high-demand fields (Shared previously in January 2025).
