RE: Asian American Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander (AANHPI) Student Achievement Program

[Assembly Bill 183](#) appropriates \$8 million in on-going funding to the California Community Colleges (CCC) to provide culturally responsive services to enhance student educational experiences and promote higher education success for low- income, underserved, and first generation Asian American Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander (AANHPI) students and other underrepresented students. Per [Ed. Code § 79511\(c\)](#), to be eligible for the AANHPI Student Achievement Program, a college must:

- Be eligible for the Asian American and Native Pacific Islander-Serving Institution program authorized under the federal Higher Education Act
- Have experience providing student support services to AANHPI students and other underserved students.
- Have program staff that will coordinate with campus faculty and staff to effectively deliver support services to AANHPI students.

The statute also mandates that the Chancellor's Office shall, in consultation with the California Commission on Asian and Pacific Islander American Affairs (CAPIAA), select and contract with "a statewide central office at a nonprofit organization" to support colleges in implementing grant requirements. [Ed. Code §79511\(b\)\(1\)](#) The Chancellor's Office has selected the Foundation for California Community Colleges to be our partner nonprofit organization in setting up the Central Office for the AANHPI Student Achievement Program.

2022-2023 ALLOCATION – PLANNING GRANTS FOR 43 COLLEGES

The Chancellor's Office will dedicate 2022-2023 allocation to selected colleges as planning grants to engage in strategic local planning, program design, and infrastructure buildout. Based on the eligibility criteria set forth in [Ed. Code § 79511\(c\)](#), please see Appendix A for a list of 43 colleges

that are eligible to receive the planning grants. Every college will receive \$150,697 in June 2023 through Apportionment (P2- June).

As a condition of receiving the planning grants, colleges shall agree to submit a program plan through NOVA, by the end of Fall 2023. The Central Office will host a webinar with further information regarding the program plan.

SUBSEQUENT COMPETITIVE IMPLEMENTATION GRANTS

Program funding from 2023-2024 on will be awarded to colleges via a competitive RFA process. Due to statutory program requirements, only colleges receiving planning grants will be considered. The Central Office, in consultation with the Chancellor's Office and CAPIAA will develop the RFA, administer the review process, and select final awardees for the implementation grants. The central office will provide additional details regarding the competitive implementation grants in the summer of 2023.

SUPPORT RESOURCES

The Chancellor's Office, in partnership with the Central Office, will host a webinar informing the 43 California Community Colleges of the grant requirements. The Central Office will deploy additional resources to provide support to colleges participating in the AANHPI Student Achievement Program on their campuses.
