Dear Leadership Teams,

As we begin this new year, our hearts go out to all those affected by the wildfires in Los Angeles and other areas across the state. Californians have proven time and again that we can overcome challenges together, and we are dedicated to helping our team in any way we can.

Earlier this month, the State released a new bold economic vision in this year's budget for California community colleges including a 2.43% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA), support for technology and data upgrades, and a one-time budget allocation of \$43 million along with \$7 million in ongoing funding to expand credit for prior learning and an additional \$50 million for the development of a Career Passport program. The Governor's budget announcement included a focus on economic development goals consistent with Vision 2030.

This edition of our newsletter provides a glance into the events and impactful moments from the last couple of months, as well as the introduction of WEDD's new Visiting Dean of Workforce, and a few new apprenticeship opportunities to continue our efforts to meet the Governor's goal of 500,000 apprentices by 2029.

Looking ahead, our team is optimistic about the dynamic tone set for 2025, and we are excited to build an incredible year of programs and opportunities for our students!

Vision 2030 Regional Convening

In November, The Orange County Regional Consortium held their Vision 2030 Regional Convening. Over two days, leaders from Orange County Regional Consortium's community college districts and regional partners came together to align strategies and amplify a shared vision for the future of education in Orange County.



AI Summit - Los Angeles Regional Consortium (LARC)

In November, the Los Angeles Regional Consortium hosted an Artificial Intelligence Summit. The goal of this event was to demystify Generative AI and learn how industry experts are using Artificial Intelligence in the workforce both globally and in Los Angeles.

A new California Law ([AB 2876](#)) signed by the Governor last September now requires K-12 schools to teach students about Artificial Intelligence. As a result, schools are moving to incorporate AI learning into math, science and history/social science curricula. By creating synergy between industry, K-12 educators, and higher education systems LARC is setting the stage on how to prepare students with the Generative AI skills they will need regardless of career path they choose.

Apprenticeship Pathways Demonstration Project

In January, the first of three Apprenticeship Pathways Demonstration Project (APDP) regional training sessions was held, focusing on program development. This training session provided valuable tools and insights for organizations looking to build or enhance their apprenticeship programs, and covered topics like designing apprenticeship programs, establishing curricula and credit for prior learning structures for apprenticeship stakeholders, and collaborating with key apprenticeship stakeholders.

The goal of this session was to equip organizations with strategies and resources that help develop high-quality apprenticeship programs.



US ARMY CAREER FAIR

On November 1, Chancellor's Office representatives attended the US Army Career Fair in Inglewood. The Total Army Career Fair included roughly 45 different Army agencies, most of whom were looking to hire people for civilian roles. These events offer on-the-spot job offers for full-time civilian positions in a variety of career fields, including medical, logistics, education, construction, human resources and more.

APPRENTICESHIPS

APPRENTICESHIP WEEK HIGHLIGHT

California local governments are facing a workforce crisis. A recent study from the Institute for Local Government (ILG) found that nearly 70% of the state's cities, counties, and special districts experience challenges with recruitment and retention. These struggles may cause vacancies in critical roles that can disrupt and delay everything from social services to permit approvals.

In conjunction with National Apprenticeship Week, California Community Colleges entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Institute for Local Government (ILG) to launch the Bridge Initiative. This initiation aims to build a workforce pipeline for California's local governments through Registered Apprenticeship Programs (RAPs) in "non-traditional" fields like human resources, accounting, IT, health and human services, and more. Yolo County was confirmed as the first pilot jurisdiction to test the model.

The first cohort of the semiconductor process technical apprenticeship program recently celebrated their graduation at Foothill College at Sunnyvale! The Chancellor's Office provided the "seed funding" for this innovative program through a California Apprenticeship Initiative (CAI) grant.

The semiconductor industry faces a significant need for process technicians due to a projected talent shortage. Estimates suggest a large gap in the number of skilled workers required to meet the growing demand for chip production - particularly in advanced manufacturing facilities.

These technicians are essential in managing complex manufacturing processes, ensuring quality control, and adapting to emerging technologies like 3D stacking and chiplets. With a talent shortage on the horizon, there are ample job opportunities and competitive salaries in the field. To succeed, process technicians must engage in continuous learning to stay updated on industry advancements.

In all, the innovation shown by the Apprenticeship and Workforce Team at Foothill is extraordinary and can provide the prototype for other colleges for not only the advanced manufacturing and technology sectors but other high wage, high road occupations in the twentieth-first century.

VANESSA MUNGUIA



Vanessa Munguia was three years into her nursing career in Guadalajara, Mexico, when her husband's job transfer brought them to San Diego in 2022.

Moving 1,500 miles away, she quickly realized her nursing degree wouldn't allow her to work in California without English proficiency. Determined to continue her career, Munguia enrolled in English as a Second Language (ESL) classes at the César E. Chávez Campus of the San Diego College of Continuing Education (SDCCE) in Fall 2022. Reflecting on her experience, she says, "I fell in love with that place... they made me feel like it's my second home."

SDCCE played a pivotal role in Munguia's journey, offering tuition-free programs as part of the California Community Colleges' Vision 2030 initiative, which focuses on improving access and equity in education. With a specific emphasis on healthcare fields experiencing shortages, SDCCE helped Munguia enroll in their Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) program, which she completed in May 2024. Now working as a CNA, she's gaining valuable experience in the U.S. healthcare system and is determined to bridge the gap between her previous experience and her goals in California.

Munguia studies while she also takes care of her mother, who now lives with her and her husband. Despite all challenges, she's unwavering in her goals: "There's nothing impossible as long as you want it," she says. Her ultimate ambition is to specialize in cardiac or pediatric care, knowing it will take time and dedication.
