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INTRODUCTION

The K12 Strong Workforce Program (K12 SWP) was established as part of California's broader Strong Workforce Program initiative, which began in 2016–17 with a \$200 million investment to enhance career technical education (CTE) across the California Community Colleges. Recognizing the need to extend these efforts into earlier grades, the K12 component was launched in 2018–19 to strengthen CTE pathways for students in grades 7–12. The program invests \$163.5 million annually to strengthen career technical education (CTE) for grades 7–12. Of this, \$150 million funds local education agencies (LEAs) to expand CTE pathways aligned with regional workforce needs, \$12 million supports technical assistance through 72 Pathway Coordinators and eight Technical Assistance Providers, and \$1.5 million covers administrative costs.

For 2024–25, 247 of 293 applications were funded, fully awarding the available \$150 million. Fund distribution is based on regional factors such as unemployment rates, average daily attendance, and projected job openings. Competitive grants range from \$250,000 to \$2 million, supporting intersegmental partnerships that lead to measurable student outcomes including CTE course completion, early college credit, certifications, and post-secondary enrollment.

The program emerged from recommendations made by the Task Force on Workforce, Job Creation, and a Strong Economy, convened by the Board of Governors in 2014. The task force emphasized the importance of aligning educational programs with regional labor market demands and improving the responsiveness of CTE offerings to industry needs.

K12 SWP was designed to:

- Support intersegmental partnerships between K–12 schools, community colleges, and industry,
- Expand and improve CTE pathways that lead to postsecondary credentials and employment,
- Promote equity and access to high-quality career education for all students.

Since its inception, K12 SWP has awarded hundreds of millions of dollars through competitive grants to local education agencies (LEAs), enabling them to create new CTE programs, enhance existing ones, and build stronger connections with postsecondary institutions and employers. The program is administered jointly by the California Department of Education and the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office, with funds distributed through eight regional consortia using a weighted formula based on unemployment rates, average daily attendance, and projected job openings.

In 2024–25, the program allocated \$163.5 million statewide. Of this amount, \$150 million was for direct LEA grants, \$12 million for technical assistance through 72 Pathway Coordinators and eight Technical Assistance Providers, and \$1.5 million for administrative support. Competitive grants, ranging from \$250,000 to \$2 million, fund projects aligned with regional workforce priorities and emphasize measurable outcomes such as CTE course completion, early college credit, industry certifications, graduation rates, and postsecondary enrollment.

The initiative is governed by Part 54.5 of the California Education Code, which outlines the funding formula and eligibility criteria for the K-12 component. It remains a cornerstone of California's strategy to prepare students for high-skill, high-demand careers and to ensure a future-ready workforce.

FUNDING OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the K12 SWP is to prepare California's students for in-demand careers. K12 SWP funds are an investment to support continuous improvement and capacity-building. LEAs can choose to create new CTE courses, programs, or pathways; retool existing CTE programs with innovative practices; or expand current CTE courses, programs, and pathways that connect the K12 sector with community colleges and local industry to improve student outcomes. K12 SWP funds are opportunity funds that help LEAs implement strategies that strengthen their CTE programming and support collaboration with local community colleges to extend education and career pathways for high school graduates.

The K12 SWP is foundational to students' ability to be successful at CTE community college programs.

These outcomes show student success in secondary and postsecondary education and in the workforce. The secondary education metrics measure:

- Student completion of two or more CTE courses in high school in the same program of study;
- Completion of two or more CTE courses that include early college credit, work-based learning, or third-party certification;
- High school graduation rate; and
- Enrollment in a California community college within one year of high school graduation.

FUNDING FORMULA

The K12 SWP initiative annually funds \$150 million to support K-12 local education agencies (LEAs) in creating, improving, and expanding career technical education (CTE) pathways and programs that are aligned to regional workforce needs. The K12 SWP provides an additional \$12 million in funding for a two-tiered system of technical assistance to the field in support of both the K12 SWP and CTE Initiative Grant and \$1.5 million in funding for administration costs. The funds are allocated to LEAs to hire 72 pathway coordinators (PCs) providing the K12 system with direct technical assistance and eight technical assistance providers (TAPs) to

provide regional support to LEAs. This team provides extensive direct assistance to the field to successfully implement the program.

California has committed to budgeting \$150 million in ongoing annual funds as an education, economic, and workforce investment to build an education pipeline that prepares highly skilled individuals to fill employment gaps in regional industries across the state. The California Department of Education and the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (Chancellor's Office), in partnership, manage the K12 SWP initiative and administer funds to eight California community college regional consortia, each of which forms a K12 Selection Committee that, guided by the regional priorities in the Strong Workforce Program regional plans, awards K12 SWP funds to eligible and qualifying LEAs in its region through a competitive grant process.

Pursuant to the amount appropriated in the annual Budget Act for the K12 component of the Strong Workforce Program, \$150 million will be apportioned by the Chancellor's Office to the fiscal agent of each regional consortium based on the following weighted factors in each region:

1. The unemployment rate. This factor should comprise 33% of the allocation formula.
2. The region's total average daily attendance for pupils in grades 7-12, inclusive. This factor should comprise of 33% of the allocation formula. For purposes of this section, average daily attendance should be those figures that are reported at the time of the second principal apportionment for the previous fiscal year.
3. The proportion of projected job openings. This factor should comprise 34% of the allocation formula.
