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INTRODUCTION

In alignment with Vision 2030, the Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander Student Achievement Program (AANHPI SAP) is a critical statewide initiative to advance equitable student success across the California Community Colleges system. The program supports low-income, underserved, and first-generation AANHPI students and other historically marginalized populations by expanding access to culturally responsive services that promote persistence, completion, and transfer.

AANHPI students represent one of the fastest-growing student populations in California's community colleges. However, aggregated data often masks the wide diversity of experiences and outcomes within AANHPI communities, limiting the system's ability to identify and support students with the greatest needs. By centering disaggregated data and culturally responsive practices, the AANHPI SAP helps colleges more effectively target services and address longstanding equity gaps.

Now in its third year of implementation, the AANHPI SAP includes 51 participating colleges across the state. Colleges are implementing a wide range of services aligned with the seven focus areas outlined in statute, such as learning communities, counseling and mental health supports, career development, curriculum development, and leadership opportunities. Together, these efforts strengthen students' sense of belonging, support academic progress, and build pathways to economic mobility.

The AANHPI SAP is overseen in partnership with the Foundation for California Community Colleges (FoundationCCC), which administers the Central Office. The Central Office team provides compliance guidance and technical assistance to participating colleges, supporting alignment with legislative requirements and the seven mandated program areas. It also assists colleges with data collection and reporting in addition to facilitating shared learning and best practice exchange across participating institutions.

This report to the Legislature provides an overview of program implementation, student enrollment and outcomes, and funding allocations, highlighting the role of the AANHPI SAP in advancing equitable educational opportunities and contributing to California's long-term workforce and economic vitality.

AANHPI SAP OVERVIEW

During the 2021-22 legislative and budget cycle, California established the AANHPI SAP at the California Community Colleges and California State University systems. As outlined in Education Code section 79511, the Legislature intends that the program provides a variety of services which will be described in the next section.

The California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (Chancellor's Office) allocates AANHPI SAP funding to each eligible college annually. To be eligible, colleges must:

- Be eligible for the Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institution (AANAPISI) program authorized under the federal Higher Education Act.
- Have experience providing student support services to AANHPI students and other underserved students.
- Have program staff that will coordinate with campus faculty and staff to effectively deliver support services to AANHPI students.

FUNDING ALLOCATION FORMULA AND COLLEGE ALLOCATIONS

The legislature allocated \$6,480,000 in on-going funds for the program. For the 2024-2025 academic year, the Chancellor's Office allocated \$100,000 to each of the 51 colleges as base funding. Colleges received additional funds based on their total college student enrollment, total Pell Grant recipients, total AANHPI students, and total AANHPI Pell Grant recipients. Please see "Appendix A" for specific amounts for each college.

Colleges have local control over how to spend these funds. While they have flexibility, funds must be used to implement activities and practices that promote the wellness and academic success of underserved AANHPI and other historically marginalized student populations. Per the Education Code, community colleges will provide students with all the following services:

- Culturally responsive learning communities.
- Advising and counseling services.
- Mental health counseling and awareness services.
- Career development, career readiness, and employment services.
- Supplemental instruction and tutoring, such as English language development and support.
- Asian American, Pacific Islander studies courses and curriculum development.
- Leadership development, internships, and mentorships.

KEY FINDINGS

EMERGING HIGH-IMPACT PRACTICES

- **Learning Communities:** Nearly all participating colleges (47 of 51) have fully implemented culturally responsive learning communities (Focus Area 1), with 43 colleges also implementing leadership, internship, and mentoring services (Focus Area 7), indicating strong statewide adoption of core program strategies.
- **Ambassadors and Formal Student Roles:** The FoundationCCC Student Ambassador Program provided 44 students from 14 colleges with statewide professional experience, offering leadership, networking, and community engagement opportunities. Building on this model, colleges are now creating more formal student roles, such as peer mentors and campus ambassadors, to expand leadership opportunities alongside academic and peer support.
- **Course-Based Cohorts:** While 11 colleges currently operate course-based cohorts, an additional 19 colleges reported plans to launch or expand these models, signaling increased integration of culturally responsive practices into academic coursework.
- **Regional and Statewide Events:** More than half of colleges reported student participation in regional or statewide events, expanding opportunities for professional exposure, networking, and peer learning beyond the campus level.

STUDENT OUTCOMES

- A total of 221,865 AANHPI students enrolled in at least one participating institution—an increase of 61,085 students since the program’s first year. Among these students, 99,826 were from low-income backgrounds (up 10,753) and 46,602 were first-generation students (up 11,566).
- Across participating colleges, AANHPI students achieved higher rates of transfer to four-year institutions, degree completion (including Associate Degrees for Transfer), certificate attainment, and California community college baccalaureate degrees in 2024–25 compared with 2022–23. These gains align with the program’s expanded college participation.
- Specifically, from 2022–23 to 2024–25:
 - Total student transfers: 15,698 (increase of 978 students)
 - Associate Degrees awarded: 8,995 (increase of 1,647 degrees)
 - Associate Degrees for Transfer awarded: 5,475 (increase of 1,262 ADTs)
 - Certificates awarded: 8,275 (increase of 1,739 certificates)


Figure 2: AANHPI Student Enrollment at AANHPI SAP Colleges (2022-23 to 2024-25)¹

 - California community college Baccalaureate Degrees earned: 35 (increase of 20 degrees) (See Figure 2)

- The data for the number of students served who obtained a job upon completion is not available at this time.
- According to the AANHPI SAP Central Office’s annual reports from all 51 participating colleges for FY 2024–25, the program collectively served more than 48,000 students through AANHPI SAP funding, demonstrating its substantial impact on student access and success. Fourteen colleges did not report a number because of the inability to capture this data at the local campus level (see Appendix B).

AANHPI SAP SERVICES

Colleges provide a wide range of services that align with the seven focus areas established in the legislation. Implementation of these services has expanded significantly across colleges during FY 2022–23 to 2024–25 (see Figure 1). Nearly all colleges have fully implemented services in Focus Area 1 (Culturally Responsive Learning Communities) and Focus Area 7 (Leadership, Internships, and Mentoring). By contrast, implementation is less consistent in other areas: only 32 of 51 colleges have fully implemented services in Focus Area 6 (AANHPI Courses and Curriculum), while the fewest colleges (31) have fully implemented Focus Area 5 (Supplemental Instruction and Tutoring), with 8 reporting no current implementation plan. These patterns highlight both areas of strong progress and opportunities for targeted support to ensure full implementation across all focus areas. For a comprehensive breakdown of all services provided by each college, please refer to Appendix D.

Figure 1: Number of Colleges Implementing Each Focus Area



The narrative that follows provides a more detailed examination of three Focus Areas with the most robust information:

- Focus Area 1: Culturally responsive learning communities
- Focus Area 3: Mental health services
- Focus Area 7: Leadership, internships, and mentorship

Focus Area 1: Culturally Responsive Learning Communities

Colleges implemented a wide range of strategies to build culturally responsive learning communities, with the most common approach being cultural recognition and enrichment programming—41 colleges hosted events, celebrations, or activities that affirmed AANHPI identity and visibility on campus. In addition, 22 colleges established non-course-based cohort and mentoring communities, providing students with year-round peer and staff support that strengthened their sense of belonging beyond the classroom.

Other strategies included culturally responsive counseling and advising at 18 colleges, professional development and capacity-building activities at 14 colleges, and student leadership and peer mentorship opportunities at 14 colleges. Colleges also reported experiential learning opportunities and community partnerships at 12 institutions each, further expanding the ways students engage with culturally affirming experiences.

While fewer colleges currently offer course-based learning communities where students enroll together in interconnected courses, this area shows strong potential for growth. Eleven colleges reported active course-based cohorts, and another 19 plan to launch or expand such models. This trend reflects increasing recognition of the value of integrating culturally responsive practices directly into academic coursework to enhance student engagement and success. This is critical because learning communities are strongly correlated with improved student persistence and retention, making these efforts a critical component of long-term success strategies.

Focus Area 3: Mental Health Counseling and Awareness Services

Colleges employed multiple strategies to support student mental health, with the most common approach being mental health workshops and campus events offered by 23 colleges. These activities focused on increasing awareness of mental health services, stress management, and reducing stigma—underscoring a strong emphasis on prevention and community engagement.

Beyond workshops, 11 colleges provided direct mental health counseling services, addressing the need for individualized support despite limited campus capacity for broader implementation. Additionally, nine colleges prioritized outreach and communication efforts to ensure students were informed about available resources and how to access them. To create culturally affirming environments, six colleges established wellness or safe spaces, offering students a place to seek support and build resilience.

Mental health services are a critical component of student success, and these efforts reflect colleges' commitment to addressing the holistic needs of AANHPI students and reducing barriers that impact retention and achievement.

Focus Area 7: Leadership Development, Internships, and Mentorships

Colleges reported a wide range of activities to support student leadership development, internships, and mentorships. Twenty-five colleges indicated that students attended or presented at regional and statewide conferences, providing professional exposure, networking opportunities, and platforms to share their experiences with broader audiences.

In addition, 13 colleges offered formal campus roles such as peer mentors or student ambassadors, enabling students to support their peers while gaining leadership and professional experience. Ten colleges facilitated student-led organizations, clubs, events, and panels, creating opportunities for students to develop skills in organization, communication, and community leadership. Furthermore, eight colleges hosted leadership workshops and trainings, designed to strengthen student leadership capacity both on campus and in professional contexts beyond college.


Leadership development is a critical component of student success, as these experiences build confidence, foster career readiness, and create pathways to civic and professional engagement. By investing in these opportunities, colleges are equipping AANHPI students with the skills and networks needed to thrive in higher education and beyond.

STUDENT ENROLLMENT AND OUTCOMES

The program is actively building a data infrastructure to track which students receive direct support. While this data is not yet available, this report highlights the demographics and degree attainment of all AANHPI students enrolled at funded AANHPI SAP colleges. Because many students attend more than one college, counts may be duplicated across institutions.

In its first year (2022–23), the 43 participating colleges enrolled 160,780 AANHPI students, including 89,073 from low-income backgrounds and 35,036 first-generation students (see Figure 2). Program participation expanded over the next two academic years, and by 2024–25, 51 colleges were involved, with 221,865 AANHPI students enrolled, including 99,826 from low-income backgrounds and 46,602 first-generation students (see Appendix C for college-level details). Counts may include students attending multiple colleges. A distinct statewide count of “underserved” AANHPI students, separate from income and first-generation indicators, is not currently available and is not reported as a standalone metric. This growth underscores the program’s increasing reach and impact across the AANHPI student population.

¹ Counts include all AANHPI students served at participating colleges. Students attending more than one college may be counted multiple times. Data on “underserved” AANHPI students, distinct from low-income or first-generation status, is not currently collected and is not reported separately.

The number of AANHPI students transferring to four-year institutions or earning California community college degrees or certificates increased in 2024–25 compared with 2022–23, reflecting the expansion of the AANHPI Student Achievement Program to additional colleges (see Figure 3). By 2024–25, participating colleges reported nearly 1,000 more student transfers, approximately 1,200 additional Associate Degrees for Transfer, and 20 more bachelor’s degrees awarded, demonstrating the program’s growing impact on student success.

CONCLUSION

The AANHPI Student Achievement Program continues to demonstrate its value as a critical investment in California’s future. Over the past three years, colleges have implemented a wide range of high-impact practices that align with the seven legislative focus areas, including creating culturally responsive learning communities, expanding mental health services, and providing leadership development opportunities through internships, mentorships, and the FoundationCCC AANHPI Student Ambassador Program. These efforts have strengthened students’ sense of belonging, increased access to essential support services, and opened doors to both academic and professional growth, preparing students to succeed in college and beyond.

AANHPI students represent one of the fastest-growing demographics in California. Ensuring their success is not only an equity imperative but also an economic necessity. By equipping these students to complete degrees, transfer to four-year institutions, and enter high-demand careers, the program fosters economic mobility while contributing to a stronger, more competitive workforce. As enrollment increases, the program’s role in supporting equitable outcomes and California’s long-term economic vitality becomes increasingly critical, directly advancing Vision 2030’s commitment to inclusive growth.

The AANHPI SAP Central Office team is committed to sustaining and scaling this impact. Beyond compliance oversight, the team is actively building a statewide infrastructure for continuity through robust data systems, shared best practices, and targeted technical assistance. Through training, program design support, and dissemination of success stories, the Central Office ensures that colleges are equipped to measure outcomes, innovate, and continuously improve. This collaborative approach is laying the foundation for a unified, high-performing network of institutions dedicated to advancing AANHPI student success.

As AANHPI student enrollment grows, the need for programs like AANHPI SAP will expand. More colleges will qualify for funding, increasing the program’s reach and impact. The AANHPI SAP is more than an educational initiative—it is a strategic investment in equitable opportunity, workforce development, and the long-term economic strength of California, ensuring that all students have the guidance, resources, and opportunities to thrive.
