STATE AND NATIONAL GUIDANCE/EXECUTIVE ORDERS/NEWS

Gov. Gavin Newsom did not hold a news conference today. You can find more information on the state's response to the pandemic on <u>California's COVID-19 website</u>.

Below are the latest numbers:

- California now has <u>524,722 confirmed cases</u> of COVID-19, resulting in 9,703 deaths. The number of COVID-19 related deaths across the state increased by 2.1% from Monday.
- The state has performed more than 8.4 million tests. The rate of positive tests over the past 14 days has decreased slightly to 6.4%.
- Latinx Californians continue to be disproportionately impacted by the coronavirus across the state, making up 58% of all total cases.
- As of August 4, local health departments have reported 24,922 confirmed positive cases in health care workers and 131 deaths statewide.

Congressional leaders today continue dialogue and negotiations on <u>additional federal coronavirus relief assistance</u>, including discussions of how funding will be allocated to colleges. If funding is based on based on Full-Time Enrollment (FTE) rather than total enrollment (aka "headcount"), <u>many students may not receive the support they need</u> to continue and complete their education.

At least 4,748,806 coronavirus cases and 156,311 fatalities have been reported in the United States since February. Worldwide, more than 700,000 fatalities have been reported.

Dr. Anthony Fauci, the nation's top infectious disease expert, spoke today with CNN and stated <u>the testing delays seen</u> <u>in the U.S.</u> are "unacceptable," he urged a more cohesive response throughout the country and <u>reiterated the</u> <u>importance of practicing preventative measures</u>.

The DMV on Tuesday announced the <u>expansion of online services</u> with commercial driver's license renewals.





Chancellor Oakley this week <u>issued a Call to Action</u> encouraging colleges, partners and all higher education advocates to contact their Member of Congress, as well as California's two U.S. senators, and urge them to support the use of headcount rather than FTE in the forthcoming stimulus package currently under negotiation by congressional leaders.

The Chancellor's Office is committed to keeping everyone informed during this uncertain time. We encourage administrators, faculty, staff and students to regularly check the <u>Chancellor's Office COVID-19 resource page</u> and the <u>Chancellor's Office Communications to Colleges section</u> for ongoing executive orders, guidance memos and announcements. Current and prospective students can also get connected with their local college to find out specific resources and support services available as well as enroll in their local community college.

Shasta College on Monday announced the <u>fall semester will commence on August 17</u> with a majority of classes being held online.
