STATE AND NATIONAL GUIDANCE/EXECUTIVE ORDERS/NEWS

Gov. Gavin Newsom today gave an update on the COVID-19 pandemic. (*The updates are streamed live at noon on Gov. Newsom's Twitter page and the California Governor Facebook page. Find more information on the state's response to the COVID-19 pandemic on California's COVID-19 website.*)

Among the headlines from today's update:

- ➤ Gov. Newsom today discussed the <u>legislation</u> that took effect Monday that protects many Californians who are unable to pay their rent or mortgage because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Under the legislation, no tenant can be evicted before February 1, 2021 as a result of rent owed due to a COVID-19 related hardship accrued between March 4 August 31, 2020, if the tenant provides a declaration of hardship according to the legislation's timelines. The governor today also unveiled a <u>new website</u> that offers guidance and resources for landlords, tenants and homeowners on the new eviction framework and protections.
- California now has <u>712,052 confirmed cases</u> of COVID-19, resulting in 13,163 deaths. The number of COVID-related deaths increased by 1.1 percent from Monday's total of 13,018.
- > The state saw an average of 4,708 new coronavirus cases per day over the last seven days, and the daily total on Tuesday was down to 4,255 cases.
- The state has performed 11.5 million COVID-19 tests. The rate of positivity over the last 14 days has dropped to 5.1% and is down to 4.4% over the last seven days.
- ➤ Hospitalizations and ICU admissions are both down 23% over the past 14 days.

Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin said this week that <u>a new stimulus package is still needed</u> to help the economy recover from the ravages of the coronavirus, and he committed to calling Speaker Nancy Pelosi to try to restart talks.

The Trump administration says the U.S. <u>will not participate</u> in a global push to develop a COVID-19 vaccine, in part because the effort is led by the World Health Organization. Dr. Anthony Fauci, the nation's top infectious disease expert, today predicted that a <u>coronavirus vaccine will be available by the end of 2020</u>, though many health officials across the country say their <u>departments lack the staffing, money and tools</u> to distribute, administer and track hundreds of millions of doses once a vaccine is made available.

Beware of family gatherings, <u>off-campus parties</u> and backyard barbecues this holiday weekend. <u>COVID-19 cases could explode after Labor Day</u> and health experts say it's up to us to stop it.
